LIVING LANDSCAPE OF SKŪXWÚ7MESH ÚXWUMIXW

The following perspective has been provided by Tsawaysia Spukwus, Skŷxwú7mesh Úxwumixw Junior Elder and member of our 2026 Conference Committee. As you look at this map, we invite you to hold both the names and spaces you know (as renamed by settlers in English), as well as the original Skŷxwú7mesh names and stories within them.

Long before European contact, the 360 degrees surrounding us was everything a community needed to thrive: pharmacy, grocery store, hardware store, and spiritual home, all at once. The mountains, rivers, and shorelines we're gathered among are not simply a backdrop to heritage. They are living heritage and inseparable from the people who have cared for them.

Líl'wat (Lil'wat) Nation
(North neighbour)

t'ak't'ak mu'yin tl'a ininyaxa7n (Black Tusk)
means 'Landing Place of the Thunderbird'

Nch'kaý (Mount Garibaldi)
Legend of 'The Great Flood'

Kwékwetxwm (Shannon Falls) means 'Never Stops Running' Kooks-xum. Legend of 'The Two-Headed Sea Serpent (Sinulhƙay) That Got Slayed by Xwichatal At The Top of Shannon Falls'

Stá7mes / Smanit Siyam (The Chief)
Stá7mes means 'Shelter' of Sta-mus village. Smanit Siyam means 'Chief' or 'Respected Leader'. Legends of 'How the Chief Came to Be', 'Ƙalkalilh' (Cannibal Woman), 'Sinulhƙay' (2-headed sea-serpent) and 'The Longhouse'.

Legend says the lake is bottomless and that the two-headed sea serpent slithered through the lake and up the first peak of The Chief. You can see the black mark of the serpent's trail going up the Chief.

Built before road access to Britannia, these structures reflect strong proportions and innovative design, now revitalized to complement the Britannia Mine Museum and support destination tourism.

Mill No. 3 remains an industrial landmark that has evolved from an economic engine into a derelict relic into a treasured National Historic Site and dynamic platform for storytelling. Its rehabilitation and conservation, involving complicated coordination of window and siding replacement, climate action commitments, scoping setbacks, and hard-won compromises, has been anything but ordinary. In this session, speakers will share their personal involvement in the bold decisions and real-world challenges behind the transformation of Mill No. 3 since 2005 when its rehabilitation began. Candid and practical, they'll share lessons learned to help inform and inspire today's heritage conservation projects.

An Archaeological, Cultural and Environmental History of the Squamish Valley

Professor Reimer brings an Indigenous perspective to the archaeological and environmental history of the Squamish Valley and its connections to the broader Salish Sea. A Coast Salish sense of time is used to span the past 12,000 years of sea level fluctuations, glacial shifts, and evolving ecosystems.

His presentation will explore how people have adapted to and managed marine and terrestrial environments over millennia, providing examples from archaeological sites ranging from sea level to high alpine regions. He will also examine how archaeological science and Indigenous knowledge can be woven together for a more holistic understanding of the past.

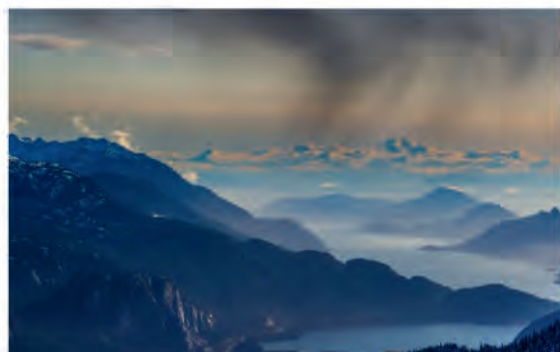

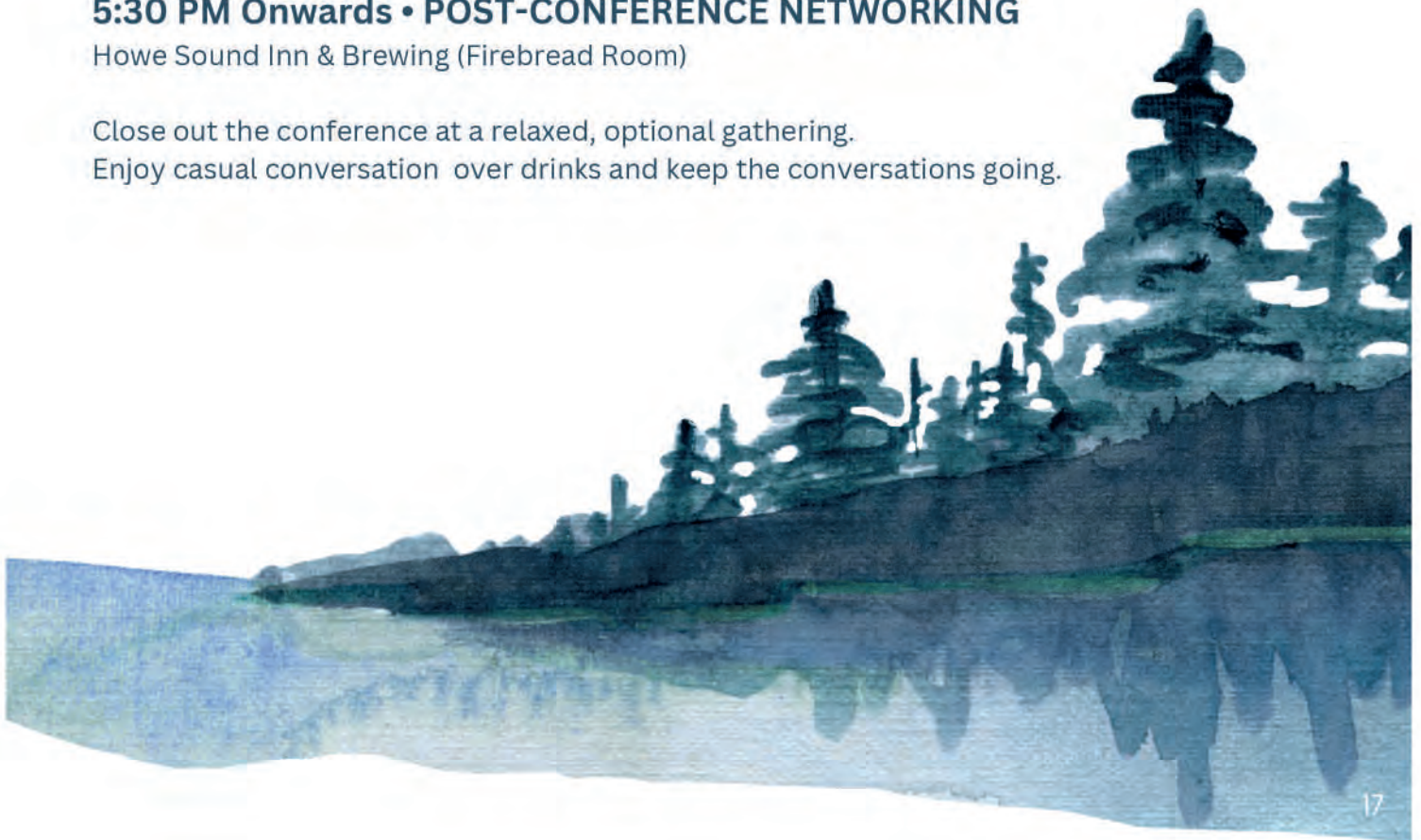

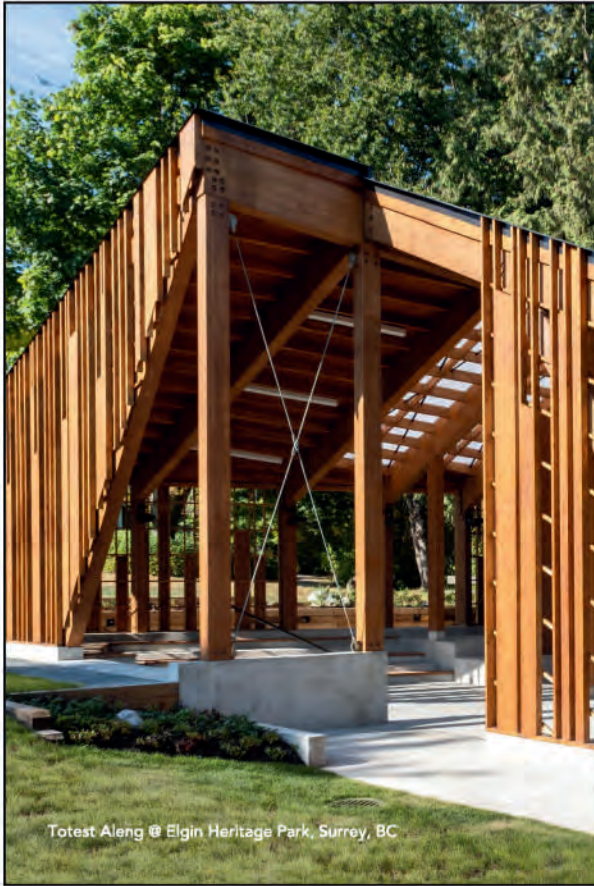
